## The Global Corner Continues to Touch Lives!

In this year's **Passport** Italy, students to learned to recognize "the boot" peninsula that projects into the Mediterranean Sea.

Miss Jeanne shared with them all sorts of interesting facts in the Introduction-did you know, for example that Vatican City is actually a country inside Italy? Did you know that pizza was "invented" in Italy, but pasta was not? Did you know that in ancient Rome, the emperor had his soldiers go up into the mountains to bring back snow that was mixed with honey and nuts to make what may have been the world's first frozen treat? We were very lucky to have several teachers this year with a connection to Italy: one, Miss Dora was born in Italy, and two others,

Miss Lisa and Miss Michele have Italian heritage-their families came from Italy.

Ancient Rome: Of course, how could we talk about Italy without mentioning the importance of ancient Rome? In this class, Ms. Ramani

showed the students what life 2000 like was years ago. Here is a picture of students dressing up like ancient Romans. It's amazing to think that



so long ago, the Romans had running water, sewage systems, "central heat" and many of the amenities we think of as modern. In this activity, younger students had the chance to play hop-scotch, a game that goes back to the Roman Empire. Older students learned about Roman numerals and used them to work out some math problems.

Italian Music & Dance: Our music and dance classes are always one of the most fun, and this year's was no exception.

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Miss Brigette provided a whirlwind tour of Italian music through the ages—including the first writing of musical notes and



notations, and the invention of the piano and violin.

Students had an opportunity to watch videos of famous opera singers, and learn that opera is popular with all ages in Italy. And, the best part of the lesson was learning to do the tarantella, the national dance of Italy, while using a tamborella.

**Italian Art:** Miss Lisa was back for her fourth year of teaching art—and this year was particularly meaningful for her because her roots are Italian. In this class, students learned their colors and



shapes in Italian, and were introduced to many famous Italian artists and art forms.

Younger students created a class mosaic using the colors and shapes they had learned (see picture above). Older children learned more about Leonardo Da Vinci and his mirror writing then got to write their names backward and design their own fanciful machines. **Italian Culture:** In this class students were "introduced" to Catarina from Milan, Armando from Venice, and Marco from Naples.



Miss Dora explained how the children and their families live, giving our students a better understanding of the similarities and differences between their own lives and those of the Italian children. They also learned an Italian song that is used to teach children their numbers from one (uno) to ten (dieci). The picture above shows students learning the song.

**Italian Festivals:** Every town, city, and village in Italy has its own festival, so we thousands of celebrations to choose from when developing this lesson. Miss Michele, whose family came from Italy, taught about three of the most famous: the Carnivale of Venice, the Palio di Sienna, and the Regatta of the Ancient Maritime Provinces.
